The Rising Tide: Women at Cambridge is an exhibition of two parts. Displays in the Milstein Exhibition Centre focus on the experience of being a woman at Cambridge University over the past 150 years. Along the front corridors of the library hang portraits of women associated with the University.

This exhibition marks 150 years since the founding of Cambridge's first women's college. It focuses on the lived experience of women at Cambridge, the fight for equal educational rights, and the careers of some of the women who shaped the institution (and the world). This story is told through costumes, letters, and audio-visual material, with visitors getting the chance to explore collections from across the University and Colleges.

Women at Cambridge

Murray Edwards College

Murray Edwards was founded in 1954 as New Hall, with the intention of providing more provision for women students at Cambridge, which was then the university with the lowest proportion of women undergraduates in Britain.

Lucy Cavendish

Founded in 1965 for female graduates, this college expanded to admit female undergraduates over the age of 25 in 1972. It will admit male students from 2021.

Darwin College

Founded in 1964 as a graduate college, Darwin was the first to admit men and women from its establishment.

Senate House

This was the location of two hotly contested votes over women's membership of the University in 1897 and 1921, both of which were lost. Huge crowds gathered to witness the votes, display placards and effigies, and exchange missiles of eggs, fireworks, peas and confetti.


Robinson College

This was the first Cambridge undergraduate college to be co-educational on its foundation in 1981.

Magdalene College

This was the last formerly all-male college to admit women, in 1988. Its Governing Body declared that it had 'made a conscientious attempt to see if there was a genuine market for a single-sex men's College, and to cater for it.... There is no significant demand.'

Churchill, King's and Clare Colleges These were the first formerly all-male colleges to admit women undergraduates, in 1972.
