According to FoodCycle, in the UK, we waste five million Christmas puddings, two million turkeys and 74 million mince pies every year –Plan meals ahead of time to avoid food waste and start making room in the freezer for storing leftovers now and if you can't get through it all, download the Olio app so unused food can be put to good use by others in your area. Shopping locally is better for the environment, so take your own bags and buy fruit and vegetables loose when possible to minimise plastic.
